### HISTORY SPOTLIGHT

### Women's History Month

A time to celebrate us and those that came before us! M-A-R-C-H back through the past to the 2024 present with this year's theme to celebrate "Women Who Advocate for Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion." Women's History Month is a month dedicated to honoring women's contributions in global and U.S. history.

#### International

Women have resolved conflicts in their homes, schools, and communities for generations. By rejecting violence, the stress has been to restore respect, establish justice, reduce conflict, and promote the common good. International Women's Day is celebrated globally on March 8th to put a spotlight on issues such as gender equality, reproductive rights, and violence/abuse against women/girls in countries around the globe. The IWD 2024 campaign theme is *Inspire Inclusion*. We forge a better world when women themselves are inspired to be included, there's a sense of belonging, relevance, and empowerment. In 1911 and to the present, countries around the world gathered to celebrate the holiday with educational initiatives, demonstrations and uplifting women in local communities by giving flowers or other gifts.

#### **National**

February 28, 1909 marked the first Women's History Day in New York City. It commemorated the one-year anniversary of the 15,000 women who marched in the garment workers' strike to protest their working conditions. Safety standards did not exist and the factory burned down killing many workers. Women's history wasn't included in K - 12 school curriculums. Women couldn't vote and the list goes on. Every year the National Women's History Alliance, formerly the National Women's History Project, campaigned to recognize Women's History Week. They are committed to the goals of education, empowerment, equality, and inclusion.

Finally, in 1980, President Jimmy Carter declared the week of March 8th, Women's History Week across the country. By



1986, fourteen states declared the entire month of March Women's History Month. Total success came in 1987 when activists were successful as they lobbied Congress to declare March as Women's History Month. Since 1995 every president has issued a proclamation declaring March Women's History Month, usually with a statement about its importance.

A very interesting fact is that it wasn't until 1965 that all women could legally vote. And women couldn't get credit cards on their own until 1974. Why was this so? On August 26, 1920, the 19th amendment granted women the right to vote. However, at that time, a number of other laws prohibited Native American Women, Black, Asian, and Latinx American Women from voting. In 1924 Native Women born in the U.S. were granted citizenship, allowing them to vote. In 1965 President Lyndon B. Johnson signed the Voting Rights into law and all women could legally vote. Congress passed the Equal Credit Opportunity Act of 1974 so that women could get credit cards in their own name. Today, the U.S. population is 50.8% female according to Census data. Women age 85 and older outnumber men by about 2 to 1 according to data. (4.1 million women to 2.2 million men in the U.S.) Fifty-nine percent of women continue their education after high school, compared to fifty percent of men.

The pay gap has narrowed but women earned 84% of what men earn according to research.

During the Pandemic 2021, 57.8% of all women participated in the labor force. About one million women returned to the workforce compared to 666,000 men. In 2022 women now outnumber men in the college-educated labor force. (50.7%)

#### State

Why in 2024 is it important to recognize women? Historically women didn't always get their due. Women past and present are inspirational, have strength, and have a story. Let's celebrate! The National Women's History Alliance continues today to lead a consortium of women's groups and historians in efforts to lobby for recognition of achievements. They state that a positive future can only be achieved by eliminating bias and discrimination "entirely from our lives and institutions." Every year in March we will highlight the contributions of women to events in history, culture, and contemporary society. Women have made tremendous strides over the decades so let's celebrate them and how important women have always been in American society! Let's celebrate our club's membership and appreciate what every member contributes to our West Deptford community!

# Garden District Spring Conference and Achievement Day

# Legislation Updates

On February 13, the House of Representatives passed the Frederick Douglas Trafficking Victims Prevention and Protection Reauthorization Act, providing a four-year reauthorization for the Trafficking Victims Protection Act. This is to ensure an integrated, whole of government response to fighting human trafficking.

On February 14, the House of Representatives approved House Resolution 966 condemning all rape and forms of sexual violence as weapons of war, including those acts committed by Hamas terrorists on and since October 6, 2023.

The resolution also calls on all nations to criminalize rape and sexual assault and hold accountable all perpetrators of sexual assault, including state and non-state armed groups.

#### Convention

The NJSFWC Annual Convention will be held on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday – May 6th–8th at the Hard Rock Hotel and Casino in Atlantic City. There will be many interesting workshops, dinners, exhibits and speakers. Each day also includes a business session. Proposed amendments to the NJSFWC bylaws will be voted on and new officers for the State will be elected.

Registration for one day is \$25.00 and \$45.00 for all three days. Monday night's dinner is \$75.00 and Tuesday night's dinner is \$93.00. I will turn in the registration and meals form for the Club as the State requires one form with a club check.

If you are interested in attending, please let me know by April 1st. The special room rate for the hotel is \$123.85 and an extra \$20 per person after two people. # NJSFWC Supports Domestic Violence Shelters through Statewide Day of Service

Over 15,000 items were collected for 17 agencies across the state

NEW BRUNSWICK, NJ – February 2024 – The New Jersey State Federation of Women's Clubs (NJSFWC) of the General Federation of Women's Clubs (GFWC) held its annual Day of Service in January to great success. This year, clubwomen collected items needed for domestic violence shelters across New Jersey. A total of 15,034 products and over \$1000 in gift cards were donated statewide.

Each of the eight NJSFWC districts worked with the specific needs of their local shel-

ters, serving a total of 17 domestic violence agencies across New Jersey. Items included \$10 Gift cards to Target, Walmart, Stop & Shop, and Shop Rite; shampoos and conditioners; toothpaste, toothbrushes, and dental floss; feminine hygiene products; toilet paper, paper towels, and tissues; laundry detergent and dishwashing liquid; and diapers and baby wipes.

Martin Luther King, Jr. Day is the only Federal holiday designated as a National Day of Service to encourage all Americans to volunteer to improve their communities. During the last quartercentury, the MLK Day of Service has grown, and its impact increased as more Americans embraced the idea that citizenship involves taking an active role in improving communities.

### National Kidney Month

March is National Kidney Month, with March 14 celebrating World Kidney Day. The day is a worldwide campaign to raise awareness of the importance of our kidneys to overall health and to try to alleviate the frequency and impact of kidney disease. Chronic Kidney Disease affects over 85 million people worldwide and is the 8th leading cause of death.

I selected this topic with our dear friend Al Nicolosi in mind. As you all know, Al has been waiting for a new kidney for some time now. There are around 101,000 Americans on the transplant list with only 17,000 receiving a kidney each year. The average time frame wait can be 3-5 years but is usually much longer.

One interesting fact I found is what the kidney symbolizes. In the Old Testament, most frequently, the kidneys are associated with the most inner strings of emotional life.

The kidneys are two bean- shaped organs, each about the size of a fist. They are located below the rib cage on either side of the spine. Kidneys filter all your blood up to 25 times a day. Healthy kidneys filter about a half cup of blood every minute, removing waste and extra water to make urine. The urine flows from the kidneys to the bladder where it is stored. Your kidneys also remove acid that is produced by cells in your body and maintain a healthy balance of water, salts and minerals in your blood. Without this balance, nerves, muscles and other tissues may not work normally.

Kidney disease means simply that the kidneys are damaged and cannot filter blood as they should. This causes waste to build



up in the body. Kidney damage occurs slowly over many years with this gradual loss of function being called chronic kidney disease (CKD). Tests for kidney disease can be done in your doc-

tor's office with a blood or urine test.

Most people with CKD have no symptoms until kidney damage is advanced. After time you may experience feeling tired and sick all the time. Kidney failure is when you need a transplant or go on a blood filtering treatment called dialysis. Before you ever reach that stage other health problems usually develop. A major problem is heart disease. Others include high blood pressure and diabetes and Lupus. Heart disease is the most common cause of death among people who have kidney disease. Exploring kidney and heart disease can help you find ways to stay healthy. You can embrace a kidney-healthy lifestyle by taking steps to build healthy habits. This may include eating healthy foods, limiting sodium, being active for 30 minutes a day, sleeping 8 hours a night, maintaining a healthy weight, avoiding stress and seeing your doctor regularly. If you smoke... QUIT and limit your alcohol consumption.

Green ribbons are used to represent kidney disease and kidney cancer. People who are on dialysis, have received a kidney transplant or who are living kidney donors also wear these Green Ribbons to help raise awareness. Please consider being an organ donor or being tested to become a living kidney donor.

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
